# Self Catheterisation for Men (Intermittent Catheter)


If you have a condition where you can't empty your bladder completely intermittent catheterisation may be needed.

## What equipment do I need?

- Catheter
- Moist towelettes
- Antimicrobial hand gel
- Water based lubricant
- Container to collect urine (if needed)

#### How to insert your catheter

- 1. Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water and place equipment on a clean accessible area
- 2. Open catheter and apply lubricant to the tip
- 3. Remove your clothes from the lower portion of your body or move your clothing out of the way
- 4. Position yourself either sitting on the toilet or standing
- 5. Hold your penis up with one hand, pull back the foreskin and clean the head of the penis with moist towelettes
- 6. Clean your hands with antimicrobial gel
- 7. Hold your penis upright at a 45/90° angle from abdomen, grasp the catheter about 7 cm from the tip and gently insert the catheter into the urethra until urine starts to flow. Insert the catheter a little further and allow urine to drain down into the toilet or container



- 8. When the urine stops, slowly pull out the catheter. Stop each time more urine starts to flow until the catheter is completely out
- 9. Dispose of catheter into the household waste (if single use), or clean the catheter as per manufacturer's recommendations, then wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water.

# Potential problems and complications:

#### No flow

Lubricant may block the catheter tip temporarily - wait while lubricant melts and allows urine to flow.

## Difficulty inserting or removing the catheter

Relax and breathe deeply, coughing sometimes helps. Never use force.

## Contact your GP if you experience any of the following symptoms:

- Blood or sediment in your urine
- Back or abdominal discomfort
- Fever—a temperature of 38°C or above
- Painful urination

# How do I get additional equipment?

The community nurse will advise you on the catheter equipment you need and where to purchase it. Always ensure you have a supply of extra catheters on hand.

You may be eligible for an equipment subsidy scheme to assist with the supply of your equipment. Please check with your community nurse.
