<b>Outline of the project</b>
<p><b>Background:</b></p> <p>The Canberra Health Service’s Alcohol and Drug Services Withdrawal Unit is trialling an occupational therapy position. People in the early stages of recovery often lack meaningful occupations because these may have been given up or reduced due to substance use (American Psychiatric Association 2013; Wasmuth et al. 2016). Occupation based interventions where individuals are involved in ‘doing’ activities can provide opportunities for people to master skills and practice new ways of thinking and new responses to challenges (Wasmuth et al. 2015). Further, the lack of new occupations in recovery can be linked to higher relapse rates, and engagement in occupations can improve treatment success (Correia et al. 2005). Occupational therapists can also provide education, assessment and interventions related to sensory processing and the use of sensory modulation to support people to regulate their emotions and engage in occupations (Scanlan and Novak 2015; Sutton et al. 2013).</p> <p>A review of peer reviewed evidence and similar services described in the grey literature, will support the development of the occupational therapy service in this unit.</p> <p><b>Research question:</b></p> <p>What is the role of an occupational therapist working in an alcohol and drug withdrawal unit, including frameworks, assessments, interventions and evaluation strategies to guide</p>

practice in this setting?
