Purpose

Trial of the Safewards Model and Interventions in ACT Public Health Services

Objectives

NM TASC project team in collaboration with ACT Public Health Services are committed to working towards finding ways to reduce the use of restrictive interventions and improve safety.

The objectives of the Trial of the Safewards Model and Interventions in ACT Public Health Services is to:

- improve relationships between staff and patients,
- increase safety,
- reduce coercion,
- spend less time on containment to invest in better engagement,
- reduce assaults leading to fewer injuries,
- produce an environment that is peaceful and conducive to supporting people,
- foster a collaborative approach between the ACT Health Directorate and the trial sites to share key learning.

Outcomes

The anticipated outcomes of the Trial of the Safewards Model and Interventions in ACT Public Health Services include:

- reduction in the use of restrictive interventions,
- increased awareness and identification of strategies to address causes of conflict within units,
- plan for sustainable cultural and practice change within units,
- improved consumer and staff experiences,
- a safer ward environment for all through reduced frequency of conflict and containment events.

Safewards Training & Education

Safewards Leads and Champions Training

The NM TASC Project has engaged the services of a Reducing Restrictive Interventions Trainer from Bendigo Heath, Victoria. The Reducing Restrictive Interventions Trainer has extensive experience in leading the Safewards training since 2014, in the initial trial of Safewards in Victoria from 2014-2016. This trainer also has also delivered face to face Safewards training to local health services in NSW, Tasmania, and South Australia.

Safewards Webinars

The Safewards webinars will introduce new interventions to the Leads and Champions in a stepped approach. The webinars will be recorded and made available to share for the pilot sites as part of ongoing education.

Ongoing education for each intervention will need to be planned at each pilot site and a record of attendance and activities maintained using your organisations template.

Scheduling of attendance at webinars and ongoing education for each intervention will need to be done in conjunction with your education team. Please feel free to share the above timeline with your education team if they are not attending the Safewards Leads and Champions one-day training session.

Safewards Community of Practice (CoP)

The Safewards Community of Practice (CoP) is an important way to maintain motivation, celebrate success and build relationships so the pilot sites can support each other and share ideas outside of their local working groups. Background

Nurses and Midwives: Towards a Safer Culture Project

In 2016, the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation (ANMF) ACT Branch advocated for a broad reaching, in-depth review of workplace safety, including a review of Occupational Violence and Aggression (OVA), Challenging Occupational Behaviours and Safe Work Practices to improve the safety of Nurses and Midwives. In the same year a commitment to developing a strategy was made in the Parliamentary Agreement of the 9th Legislative Assembly of the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). The former Minister for Health and Wellbeing and the Minister for Mental Health initiated the development of a Strategy for Nurses and Midwives being the *Nurses and Midwives: Towards a Safer Culture* (NM TASC)- The First Step Strategy, launched by both Ministers on 14 December 2018.

Governance of the Strategy is developed under the auspices of the ACT Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer (CNMO), ACT Health Directorate. Since the significant re-structure of the ACT public health system in 2018, the ACT Health Directorate now has a focus on system wide strategy, planning and policy and strives to work collaboratively with the ACT public health services to ensure the priority actions of the NM TASC Strategy are met.

One priority action to significantly impact and effect change in the ACT public health services is the implementation of the Safewards model and interventions.

The Safewards Model

The development of the Safewards model and interventions originated in the United Kingdom (UK) by Professor Len Bowers and colleagues for use in mental health inpatient units. The trial found a 14.6% decrease in **conflict** and a 23.6% decrease in **containment** (Government of Western Australia, 2016).

The objective of the Safewards model is designed to reduce **conflict** and **containment** or restrictive practices within in-patient units by identifying and addressing the causes of behaviours in staff and patients that may result in harm (**conflict**) and reduce the likelihood of this occurring.

The term **conflict** encompasses certain patient behaviours that as stated can result in harm. **Conflict** in Safewards presents as violence, verbal aggression, suicide and acts of self-harm, alcohol or drug use, property damage, and absconding (leaving the ward without permission and missing out on care) (Government of Western Australia, 2016).

Containment focuses on the methods staff use to control and manage events within the in-patient settings. In Safewards, **containment** presents as:

- Forcing medication
- Seeking one off doses that are only used to sedate in order to control behaviour
- Increased monitoring or observation of patients (including use of nurse specials)
- Restrictions placed on patients including transferring them to a more secure unit, seclusion and restraint.

Staff are required to be trained to use a range of methods to manage patient behaviours and units in a concerted effort to reduce restrictive or coercive interventions. This also requires staff to use this training to review their own behaviours and responses to **conflict** and the strategies used to manage challenging behaviours.

The Safewards Interventions

The Safewards interventions have been designed to address the various **flashpoints** outlined in the model and to reduce **conflict**-originating factors. The Safewards interventions provide preventative actions that are taken to increase safety and mutual support for staff and patients.

Safewards interventions and associated resources can be found in the <u>Appendices</u> of this document. Interventions include:

Know Each Other	Reassurance

Partnering with Consumers

Local pilot sites will wherever possible engage consumers or representatives of their service to partner and participate in the trial, including membership of the local pilot site working group. Extensive consideration has been given to ensuring consumers with lived experiences are supported and able to provide leadership within the Safewards project. The Safewards Victoria pilot evaluation identified that having a consumer or peer worker active with one or more interventions is a key element for success (Hamilton, B. et al, 2016, Safewards Victorian Trial Final Evaluation Report, p.7).


The scope of Safewards consumer engagement may include, but not limited to:

- Advisory roles
- Membership on local working groups
- Training and workshop delivery
- Implementation planning
- Participation in the Safewards Community of Practice
- Ongoing sustainability and quality improvement process
- Evaluation

Consumers will be reimbursed according to ACT Health policy by the NM TASC team.

Partnering with Consumers is a key component of Safewards as part of the National Safety and Quality Health Service (NSQHS) Standards to ensure we continue to create and maintain a health service in which there are mutually beneficial outcomes (Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care, 2019).

Governance Structures and Arrangements



Nurses and Midwives: Towards a Safer Culture Steering Committee

The Nurses and Midwives: Towards a Safer Culture (NM TASC) Steering Committee will enact the stewardship role of the ACT health system, be the decision making body, providing oversight to ensure a coordinated approach to the Trial of the Safewards Model and Intervention across ACT Public Health Services. This Committee is chaired by the Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer of the ACT Health Directorate. Other membership will include from the identified pilot sites the Assistant Directors of Nursing (ADON), HCCA and ACT MHCN Representative and the identified Quality and Safety Officers of CHS and CPHB. The NM TASC Project Officers will be ex-officio members.

Local Safewards Working Groups

The Local Safewards Working Groups will be chaired by a nominated Safewards lead and be responsible for delivery of the Safewards model. Membership of the Local Safewards Working Group will include interprofessional staff and Consumer Consultant/Peer Worker/Representative, with further consideration of membership from Quality and Safety, see <u>Appendix 3 Working Group Terms</u> of <u>Reference</u>. The NM TASC Project Officers will be available to assist the working groups.

The NM TASC Project Officers will provide support to Safewards Leads/Champions and Local Safewards Working Groups to:

- establish Safewards governance structures including action minutes of each meeting, status reporting and data collection methods, see <u>Appendix 3 Action Minutes Template</u>
- commence localised pilot site implementation plans, see <u>Appendix 3 Implementation Plan</u> <u>Template</u>,
- engage staff to become champions of Safewards interventions in their local pilot sites,
- review existing resources and commence planning for the purchase and/or development of Safewards resources.

Reporting

Regular status reports will be written by the Safewards leads about progress and next steps. The status report will be submitted to the NM TASC project team who will table the report at the NM TASC Steering Committee for Executive Sponsor review see <u>Appendix 3 Pilot Site Reporting</u>
<u>Template</u>. The NM TASC project team will be responsible for providing briefs to the Project Owner and Ministers as required.

Project Budget

The NM TASC project will allocate \$10,000 to the identified pilot sites to support them in the Trial of the Safewards Model and Interventions in their service. This budget will aid in the purchasing and maintenance of equipment, development and printing of resources and the backfilling of identified staff to attend training. It is a requirement of each site to include budget spent and report this to the NM TASC Steering Committee through the established Status Reporting Template. Payment will be made to the relevant service on production of invoices to the NM TASC project.

The below will be financially supported by the NM TASC project budget:



Evaluation

Quality Improvement (QI)

All ACT Health services are committed to continuously improving the quality of care and services we provide. Evaluating the quality of our work should be an integral part of our business. The NM TASC Project Team promote the use of the Model for Improvement when conducting QI Activities. The Model for Improvement asks three fundamental questions:

- 1. What are we trying to accomplish? (Aim)
- 2. How will we know a change is an improvement? (Data collection)
- 3. What changes will result in an improvement? (Interventions)



It is important to keep evidence of evaluation and improvements in your work area to demonstrate that work has been done to evaluate and improve services. This is particularly important for accreditation purposes.

Data Collection

The data collection for the Trial of the Safewards Model and Interventions into ACT Public Health Services will be completed in 3 stages which includes pre, during and post implementation.

- Stage 1; Planning Phase prior to the Safewards trial (November 2020-January 2021)
- Stage 2; Trial Phase of the Safewards trial (January-April 2021)
- Stage 3; Evaluation Phase of the Safewards trial (May 2021)

Data Measures

- 1. Implementation Fidelity Checklist (Appendix 6)
- 2. Safewards Pre and Post Training Surveys
- 3. Training sessions and attendance
