## **DECISION ON YOUR ACCESS APPLICATION**

I refer to your application under Section 30 of the *Freedom of Information Act 2016* (FOI Act), received by ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) on **Wednesday 10 November 2021.** 

This application requested access to:

'The evidence used to justify the recently declared Public Health (ACT School or Early Childhood Education and Care Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021?

Information provided must contain evidence to support the grounds listed below you have used to authorise the Public Health Emergency Direction.

- a. the Australian Capital Territory has experienced persistent community transmission since the outbreak of the Delta variant of COVID-19 in the Australian Capital Territory on 12 August 2021;
- b. the Delta variant of COVID-19 (labelled as a variant of concern) has proven highly transmissible both nationally and internationally, demonstrating that elimination of the virus is not feasible and community transmission will continue as the Australian Capital Territory seeks to mitigate the impact of this public health risk;
- c. there is an increased risk of transmission of COVID-19 among children (under 12 years of age) at ACT Schools and Early Childhood Education and Care facilities in circumstances where the COVID-19 vaccine is not currently available for children.
- d. high vaccination rates reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 outbreaks, providing protection against severe illness or death and a reduction in the risk of onward transmission of COVID-19.'

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General of ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) under Section 18 of the FOI Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the Act. ACTHD was required to provide a decision on your access application by **Wednesday 8 December 2021**.

I have identified four documents holding the information within scope of your access application. These are outlined in the schedule of documents included at <u>Attachment A</u> to this decision letter.

My access decisions are detailed further in the following statement of reasons and the documents released to you are provided as <u>Attachment B</u> to this letter.

In reaching my access decision, I have taken the following into account:

- The FOI Act;
- The contents of the documents that fall within the scope of your request;
- The views of relevant third parties; and
- The Human Rights Act 2004.

## **Decisions on access**

I have decided to:

- grant partial access to one document; and
- refuse access to three documents.

#### **Refuse Access**

I have decided to refuse access to three documents at references 1-3. These documents are wholly comprised of Information that would reveal deliberations of Cabinet. These documents are therefore taken to be contrary to the public interest to release, under Schedule 1.6 (1) Cabinet Information (d) the disclosure of which would reveal any deliberation of Cabinet (other than through the official publication of a Cabinet decision).

## **Partial Access**

I have decided to grant partial access to one document at reference 4. Partial redactions have been made to the document where it contains information that I consider, on balance, to be contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in Section 17 of the Act. The information contained in these folios is partially comprised of personal information.

# Public Interest Factors Favouring Disclosure

The following factors were considered relevant in favour of the disclosure of the documents:

- Schedule 2, 2.1(a)(i) promote open discussion of public affairs and enhance the government's accountability; and
- Schedule 2, 2.1(a)(ii) contribute to positive and informed debate on important issues or matters of public interest.

## Public Interest Factors Favouring Non-Disclosure

The following factors were considered relevant in favour of the non-disclosure of the documents:

• Schedule 2, Schedule 2.2 (a)(ii) prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2004.

Following the consideration of the above factors I have decided, regarding personal information, the factor favouring non-disclosure outweighed the factors favouring disclosure. Therefore, and I have determined the information identified is contrary to the public interest and I have decided not to disclose this information.

# Charges

Processing charges are not applicable to this request.

# **Disclosure Log**

Under section 28 of the FOI Act, ACTHD maintains an online record of access applications called a disclosure log. The scope of your access application, my decision and documents released to you will be published in the disclosure log not less than three days but not more than 10 days after the date of this decision. Your personal contact details will not be published.

#### **Ombudsman review**

- Vaccination of all adults around children is the most effective way to protect children from COVID-19
- There is a large body of evidence supporting the policy behind the public health order. I also note similar orders have been made in other jurisdictions, including NSW and Victoria, on the same grounds. For example, the AHPPC states that a vaccinated person is less likely to introduce COVID-19 into schools. - The public health order itself sets out the chief Health Officer's considerations as to why the direction is necessary, see here: 2021-615 (1).PDF . As you are aware this is a legal direction that must be complied with.
- I recommend that in making your decision whether to get vaccination that you get your information from trusted sources. This includes the Commonwealth and ACT COVID-19 Government websites. I cannot stress enough the importance of credible information. The Commonwealth Government has also worked to dispel many concerns about COVID-19 vaccines, this may be on interest to you: Is it true? Get the facts on COVID-19 vaccines | Australian Government Department of Health . This page is updated regularly.
- There is also information about the Australian Government's approval process for COVId-19 vaccines here: <u>Approved COVID-19 vaccines</u> | <u>Australian Government Department of Health</u> .
- As you know the public health order only applies in settings with children under the age of 12. This is because vaccines are not yet available for this group. The AHPPC states that children under 12 remain susceptible to COVID-19, however their opportunities to acquire infection are reduced if the adults around them are vaccinated. It is possible that younger students may be able to be vaccinated in time to return to school in 2022. For this reason the order only applies until 31 December, at this stage.
- Further, due to the inclusive nature of ACT schools, there are a number of students with disability and many with underlying medicals conditions across all of our schools. These students may experience worse health outcomes from COVID-19. ATAGI states that there is a stronger public health imperative to encourage vaccination of staff when schools caters for the needs of students with disability.
