#### **DECISION ON YOUR ACCESS APPLICATION**

I refer to your application under section 30 of the *Freedom of Information Act 2016* (FOI Act), received by ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) on **Wednesday 23 February 2022**.

This application requested access to:

'all documents which are relevant to two distinct decisions:

- 1. The decision to not mandate that prison officers be vaccinated.
- 2. The decision to not include prison officers among the category of workers who could not enter the CHS clinic located in the Alexander Maconochie Centre noting that it was mandated that security officers at all other CHS clinics across Canberra be vaccinated.'

I am an Information Officer appointed by the Director-General of ACT Health Directorate (ACTHD) under section 18 of the FOI Act to deal with access applications made under Part 5 of the Act. ACTHD was required to provide a decision on your access application by **Thursday 24 March 2022**.

I have identified 21 documents holding the information within scope of your access application. These are outlined in the schedule of documents included at <u>Attachment A</u> to this decision letter.

#### **Decisions**

I have decided to:

- grant partial access to 19 documents; and
- refuse access to 2 documents.

My access decisions are detailed further in the following statement of reasons and the documents released to you are provided as <u>Attachment B</u> to this letter.

In reaching my access decision, I have taken the following into account:

- The FOI Act;
- The contents of the documents that fall within the scope of your request;
- The views of relevant third parties; and
- The Human Rights Act 2004.

#### **Refuse Access**

I have decided to refuse access to two documents at references 1 and 5. The documents are comprised of information that is subject to legal professional privilege and therefore taken to be contrary to the public interest to release, under *Schedule 1.2 Information that would be privileged from production or admission into evidence in a legal proceeding on the ground of legal professional privilege*.

In addition, further information was identified under Schedule 2.2 (a)(ii) prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2004, containing mobile phone numbers of ACT government employees.

#### **Partial Access**

The document at reference 2 is partially comprised of information classified as Cabinet submission documents, and under Schedule 1.6 Cabinet Information, they are taken to be contrary to the public interest to release. This document contains further redactions made under *Schedule 2.2 (a)(ii)*, to the mobile phone numbers of ACT government employees.

The document at reference 7 contains redacted information under Schedule 1.2, referencing information subject to legal professional privilege. This document contains additional redactions under *Schedule 2.2 (a)(ii)*, to the mobile phone numbers of ACT government employees.

The documents at reference 3-4, 6, and 8-21, contain information that I consider, on balance, to be contrary to the public interest to disclose under the test set out in section 17 of the Act as the information contained in these folios is partially comprised of personal information.

#### Public Interest Factors Favouring Disclosure

The following factors were considered relevant in favour of the disclosure of the documents:

- Schedule 2, 2.1(a)(i) promote open discussion of public affairs and enhance the government's accountability; and
- Schedule 2, 2.1(a)(ii) contribute to positive and informed debate on important issues or matters of public interest.

#### Public Interest Factors Favouring Non-Disclosure

The following factors were considered relevant in favour of the non-disclosure of the documents:

• Schedule 2, Schedule 2.2 (a)(ii) prejudice the protection of an individual's right to privacy or any other right under the Human Rights Act 2004.

Therefore, I have decided this factor outweighs the public interest factors in the disclosure of mobile phone numbers and email addresses of both ACT and non-ACT government employees.

#### Charges

Processing charges are not applicable to this request.

#### **Disclosure Log**

Under section 28 of the FOI Act, ACTHD maintains an online record of access applications called a disclosure log. The scope of your access application, my decision and documents released to you will be published in the disclosure log not less than three days but not more than 10 days after the date of this decision. Your personal contact details will not be published.

#### Ombudsman review

My decision on your access request is a reviewable decision as identified in Schedule 3 of the FOI Act. 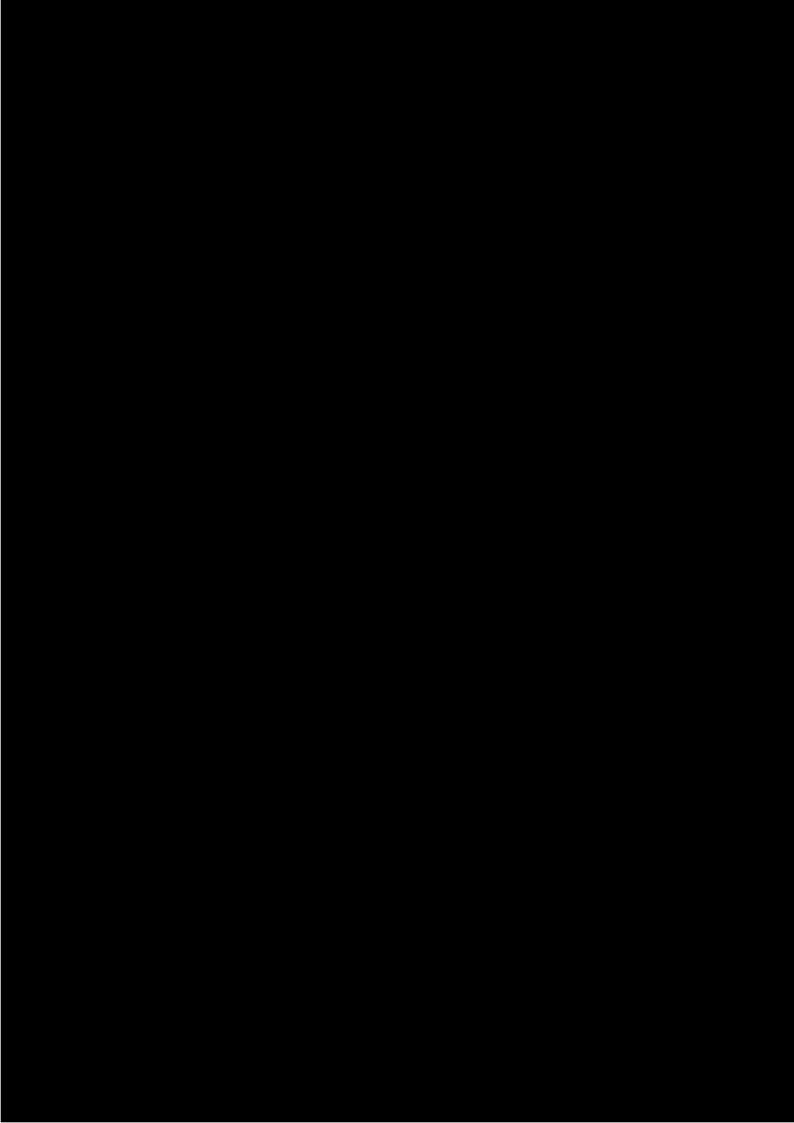

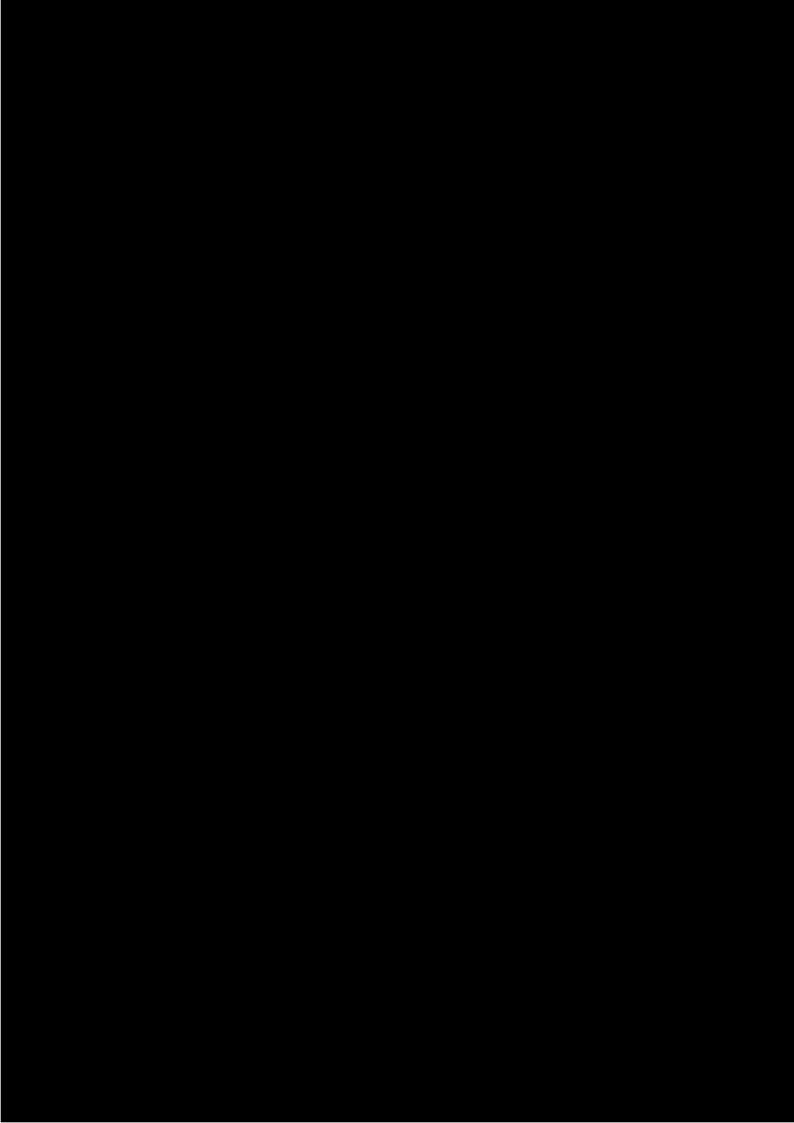

# Mandatory COVID-19 vaccination policy for health care workers

# Purpose

- 1. The Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Policy for Health Care Workers (the policy);
  - clarifies requirements for the ACT's mandatory vaccination approach to ensure the ongoing public health management of workers in health care settings is prioritised and maintained; and
  - provides guidance to health care operators and workers about mandatory COVID-19 vaccination requirements for health care workers after 31 October 2021.

# Background

- Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) is an infectious disease caused by the SARS-COV-2 virus. COVID-19 is highly contagious and is a potentially fatal condition. As a result, Public Health authorities, both internationally and nationally, have been monitoring and responding to outbreaks of COVID-19.
- 3. The ACT Government has been most recently responded to an outbreak in the ACT which has seen an extended lockdown period being implemented. The scale of risk resulting from this outbreak is significantly higher than in the previous year, noting the highly infectious 'Delta' variant of concern. There are significant and ongoing challenges being faced at a national level to suppress the spread of the virus, which is likely to continue into the future.
- Health care settings have a high likelihood of caring for people with COVID-19 and, therefore, there are higher rates of potential exposure for all workers in healthcare settings.
- 5. All State and Territory Governments are supporting the implementation of a rollout of vaccinations across their communities. Higher vaccination rates will make outbreaks much less likely, and will likely reduce the need for tightened public health restrictions to be implemented, assisting to reduce the health, social and economic impacts which the COVID-19 pandemic has presented so far.
- 6. While a fully vaccinated person may still be infected with the COVID-19 virus, vaccines authorised in Australia provide strong protection against severe outcomes and death, and reduce the risk of onward transmission of COVID-19 to patients, residents, other workers in health care settings and the wider community.
- The Chief Health Officer will sign and notify the Public Health (Healthcare workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021 by 15 October 2021 to mandate vaccination requirements for health care workers.

# Application

- This policy commences from 15 October 2021 upon the commencement of the Public Health (Healthcare Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021 (the Direction).
- Under the Direction, health care workers are required to provide proof of vaccination to their employer by the following dates.
  - A minimum first dose of a registered COVID-19 vaccine is required by no later than 31 October 2021.
  - A minimum second dose of a registered COVID-19 vaccine is required by no later than 31 December 2021.

#### Instructions

#### Health care settings and workers covered under the direction

10. Under the Direction, a health care facility includes:

- a. Public Health settings including public hospitals, public health clinics, ambulance services, patient transport services and other health services managed by the ACT Government, including a COVID-19 testing clinic and a COVID-19 vaccination community clinic.
- Private health facilities, including private hospitals, day procedure centres and specialist outpatient services.

11. Health care workers are defined, under the Direction as:

- a. Any employee of Canberra Health Services, including but not limited to any person who provides health, medical, nursing, pathology, pharmaceutical, social work or allied health services to a patient in a health care facility, including in a voluntary or unpaid capacity.
- A person who provides direct care to a patient at a health care facility (eg Assistant in Nursing);
- A person who is a student and in on a placement at a health care facility as a formal part of their education;
- d. An ambulance officer;
- Any person who provides goods or services at a healthcare facility, including in a voluntary or unpaid capacity including:
  - A person who is employed or engaged by a third party, including another ACT Government Directorate that is not Canberra Health Services, who provides goods and services at the health care facility, including a labour hire firm who provides staff to supplement the permanent workforce;
  - A direct care worker, including a personal care worker;

- An administrative staff member, including those engaged by another ACT Government Agency, including a person working in administration, management or reception services;
- An ancillary staff member, including a cleaner, a laundry staff member, a
  person performing food preparation servies, a security officer and a person
  providing maintenance services.
- A person providing lifestyle and social care, including a person providing music or art therapy or a transport driver who transports patients of the health care facility
- A person who provides commercial activities at a premises that constitutes a health care facility, whether pursuant to any lease, licence or otherwise.
- A pastoral care worker or clergy who is engaged as a contractor by a healthcare facility;

12. Persons who are excluded from the mandatory vaccination requirement include:

- a. An ad hoc volunteer
- b. A person who is a family member or friend of a patient
- Any of the following in-reach service providers or contractors (unless employed or otherwise engaged (including on a voluntary or unpaid capacity) by the health care facility:
  - o A delivery driver or person providing one-off trade deliveries
  - o A trades person
  - A legal practitioner;
  - o A guardian if attendance is necessity to exercise functions for a patient.

#### Vaccination Evidence

- 13. Health care workers are required to provide evidence to their employer, or an authorised person as determined by their employer, of their vaccination status from the Australian Immunisation Register (kept under the Australian Immunisation Register Act 2015 (Clth)) to confirm they have received one or more doses of a COVID-19 vaccine.
  - A minimum first dose of a registered COVID-19 vaccine is required by no later than 31 October 2021.
  - A minimum second dose of a registered COVID-19 vaccine is required by no later than 31 December 2021.
- 14. Health care facilities should establish their own policies and mechanisms to record vaccination status of employees and other persons who are captured by the Direction as requiring vaccination.

#### Exemptions

- 15. Some health care workers may not be suitable to receive a COVID-19 vaccination. In these instances, the Chief Health Officer may exempt a person (in writing) from mandatory vaccination who:
  - a. is unable, due to a medical contraindication, to receive a COVID-19 vaccination; or
  - b. for whom a COVID-19 vaccination is not reasonably available.
- 16. Exemptions will not be considered for health care workers who hold a conscientious objection to the COVID-19 vaccination, and who refuse to get vaccinated on these grounds.
- 17. Requests for exemption must be made in writing to the Office of the Chief Health Officer, in accordance with the exemption policy at Attachment X and will be considered on a case by case basis.
- 18. Evidence of any exemption must be provided to the employer or authorised person of the health care operator before the health care worker will be allowed to work.
- 19. The employer should consider putting in place risk mitigation measures and controls to manage workers who have received an exemption to manage work health and safety of the broader workforce.



# ACT COVID-19 Vaccination Exemption Policy for Healthcare Workers

Issue Date: September 2021

**ISSUED BY:** 

THE CHIEF HEALTH OFFICER

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#### Introduction

- The Public Health (Healthcare Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021 (the Direction) commenced on 16 September 2021.
- The purpose of the Direction is to limit the spread of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), caused by the novel coronavirus SARS-CoV-2 within a particularly vulnerable population by restricting access by unvaccinated workers to healthcare facilities.
- There may be occasions or exceptional circumstances whereby a worker at a healthcare facility is unable to fulfil the requirement to receive at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccination before commencing work.

## **Application**

- The ACT COVID-19 Exemption Policy for Healthcare Workers applies to persons covered under Attachment A of the Public Health (Healthcare Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021. The Direction provides that:
  - The Chief Health Officer may, in writing and subject to any conditions that the Chief Health Officer considers necessary, exempt a person from the Direction.
  - The Chief Health Officer may provide an exemption from the Direction to:
    - a person who is unable, due to a medical contraindication, to receive a COVID-19 vaccination; or
    - a person for whom a COVID-19 vaccination is not reasonably available.
  - If the Chief Health Officer exempts a person from the Direction, or a stated requirement under this Direction, that person must comply with the conditions of the exemption.

## **Principles**

- If a worker (as defined by the Direction) at a healthcare facility is unable to fulfil the requirement to receive at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccination before 16 September 2021, they are able to apply to the Chief Health Officer for an exemption.
- Exemptions will only be considered for:
  - o a person who is unable, due to a medical contraindication, to receive a COVID-19 vaccination
  - a person for whom a COVID-19 vaccination is not reasonably available.
- Workers must complete a Vaccination Exemption form.
- If the exemption is required for a medical contraindication, the worker must ensure Sections A and B
  of the Vaccination Exemption form are completed by an approved health professional.
- For medical contraindications, Sections A and B of the Vaccination Exemption form can only be completed by the following:
  - General practice registrars on an approved 3GA training placement
  - Paediatricians
  - Public health physicians
  - o Infectious disease physicians
  - Clinical immunologists

- o GPs who meet certain criteria:
  - i. Vocationally registered; OR
  - ii. A fellow of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP); OR
  - iii. A fellow of the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM).
- All exemption applications must also include an acknowledgement letter from the worker's employer.

### **Procedure**

- Operators at a healthcare facility are asked to write to all workers to advise them of the exemption process. A form letter is provided at <u>Attachment B</u> for use if required. The Vaccine Exemption form at <u>Attachment C</u> should be attached to the letter.
- Workers should contact the operator of the healthcare facility if they wish to apply for an exemption in order to seek a letter of acknowledgement.
- Workers should complete the Vaccination Exemption form, noting that if an exemption is required for a medical contraindication, Sections A and B must be completed by an appropriate health professional.
- The number of exemption requests processed will be reported to the Department of Health by ACT Health.

## **Process for Submitting a Request for Exemption**

- Workers should submit their exemption request to <u>ACTHealthOCHO@act.gov.au</u>. The request must include the letter of acknowledgement from the operator of the healthcare facility and a Vaccination Exemption form.
- The operator of the healthcare facility is also able to submit an exemption request on behalf of their worker, provided the Vaccination Exemption form is signed by the worker. A letter of acknowledgement from the operator is not required in this situation.
- The exemption request will be processed within three days of receipt, subject to all required documentation being provided.
- If approved, an exemption certificate with conditions will be provided by the Chief Health Officer to the applicant and the operator of the healthcare facility.
- If not approved, the applicant and the operator of the healthcare facility will be advised.

#### Criteria

- The application must include appropriate supporting documentation:
  - A letter of acknowledgement from the operator of the healthcare facility; and
  - o A correctly completed Vaccination Exemption form.
- The exemption application must fall under one of the two exemption provisions in the Direction.
- Unless supported by a health professional, the following types of scenarios are not valid reasons for exemption:
  - pre-existing conditions of any kind, including auto-immune disorders and hypertension, diabetes, asthma, pulmonary, liver and kidney disease, as well as chronic infections that are stable and controlled.
  - needle phobia
  - transport problems
  - family care requirements
  - o mild illness without fever—meaning temperature is below 38.5°C
  - o any family history of adverse events following immunisation
  - history of convulsions
  - o treatment with antibiotics

- treatment with locally acting steroids, inhaled or low dose topical
- o replacement corticosteroids
- o asthma, eczema, atopy, hay fever or sniffles
- neurological conditions
- o pregnancy
- breastfeeding
- o recent or planned surgery.
- Exemptions can be considered if a medical professional suggests a person has:
  - o a compromised immune system
  - o are severely frail
  - has a past confirmed infection with COVID-19 (noting that it is not a contraindication to vaccination, however ATAGI recommends deferring COVID-19 vaccination for up to 6 months after the acute illness).
- Or has otherwise suggested a delay due to the following medical contraindications\*:
  - having a history of confirmed mastocytosis with recurrent anaphylaxis that requires treatment
  - o having ever been diagnosed with capillary leak syndrome
  - having a history of heparin induced thrombocytopenia (HIT), central venous sinus thrombosis (CVST), blood clots in the abdominal veins (splanchnic veins) or antiphospholipid syndrome associated with blood clots
  - o have had myocarditis and/or pericarditis
  - o currently have or recently had acute rheumatic fever or endocarditis
  - having congenital heart disease
  - o having dilated cardiomyopathy (for people under 30 years of age)
  - having severe heart failure
  - o being a recipient of a heart transplant
  - o have a bleeding disorder or are receiving anticoagulant therapy (a blood thinner)
  - o have had COVID-19 in the past, or have ongoing illness from COVID-19
  - o have received any vaccine in the last 7 day
- \* COVID-19 vaccination Preparing for COVID-19 vaccination (health.gov.au)
- Exemptions can also be considered if the applicant is unable to attend a COVID-19 Vaccine Appointment before commencing work due to being:
  - unwell with fever, cough, runny nose or other symptoms that could be from COVID-19
  - o are awaiting COVID-19 test results
  - o have tested positive with COVID-19 and are in isolation
  - o are in quarantine
  - o are a close contact of someone with COVID-19

In the above scenarios, the exemption will be provided for a limited time period, noting that the person should not be attending work at this time either.

- If exemption requests are approved, they will be provided for a six month validity only unless there are substantial medical contraindications.
- Exemption approvals may include additional testing requirements until the applicant is able to have their first dose.

This will ensure that services like the daycare on the hill, red cross and the Canberra Hospital Expansion aren't included in the scope. Please ask Victor to review the health care settings licensing regime to see if there is a definition for day hospital in there we can leverage off.

2. Health care worker definition is fine and already will capture construction who are working in the wards and regular and systematic tradespersons

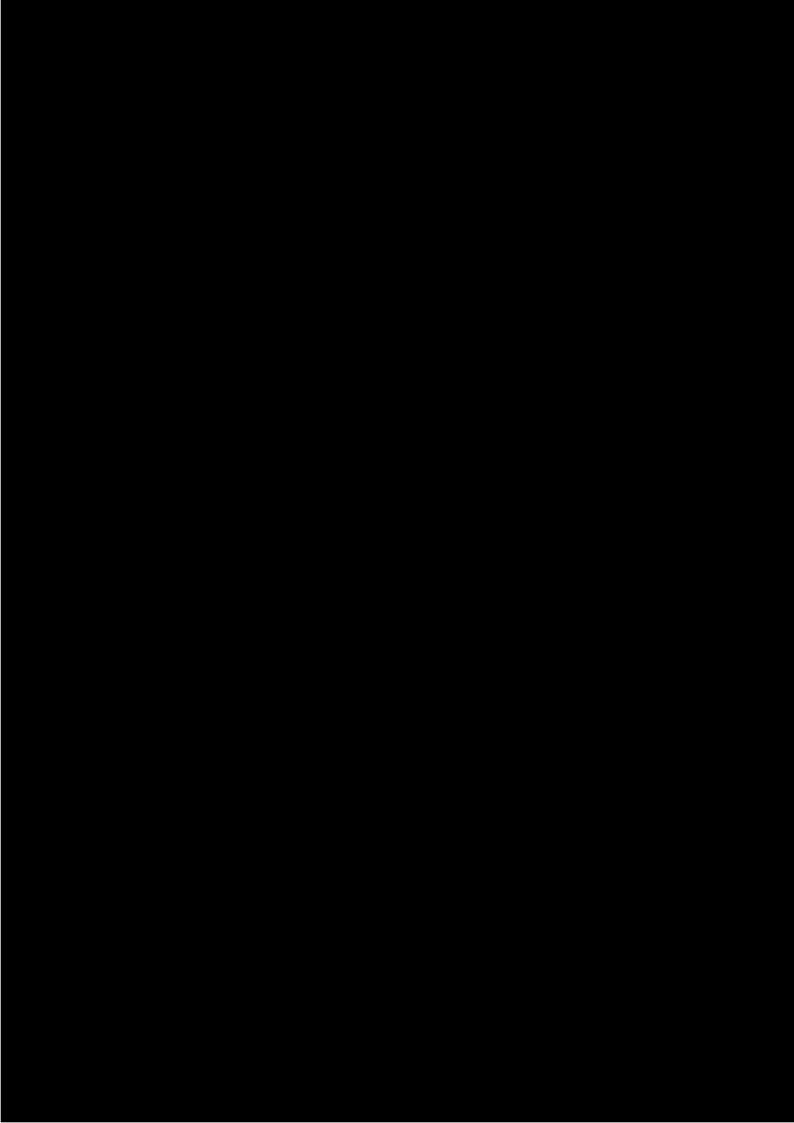

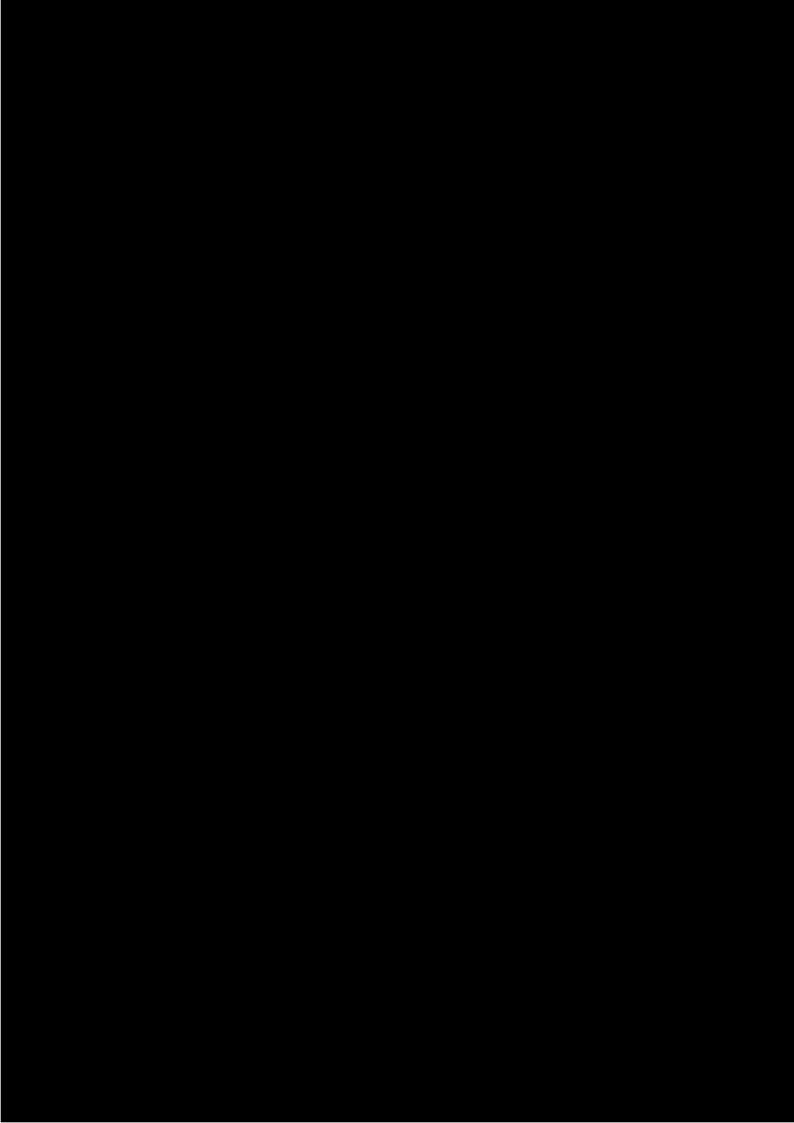

# **Background**

- 1. On 15 October 2021, I notified a public health direction for workers in certain healthcare settings to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 or have an approved exemption for them to be permitted to attend work under the *Public Health (Health Care and Support Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021* (the Public Health Direction).
- 2. At the time of commencement, most states and territories in Australia had already, or were in the process of, introducing similar mandatory vaccination requirements for healthcare workers following an Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) recommendation.

#### Issues

## **AHPPC Recommendation**

- 3. As part of its statement on mandatory vaccination of all workers in healthcare settings released on 1 October 2021, the AHPPC recommended that all jurisdictions accept a national definition of health-care settings when mandating vaccinations. The intent was to ensure (as much as possible) a national definition of healthcare worker.
- 4. The AHPPC recommended mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations for all workers in a healthcare setting as a condition of work, with first doses administered by 30 October and second doses by 15 December.
- 5. Specifically, the AHPPC recommended that healthcare worker capture:
  - a. Public health settings including public hospitals, public health clinics, ambulance services, patient transport services, correctional health facilities and other health services managed by a jurisdiction.
  - b. Private health facilities such as private hospitals or day procedure centres or specialist outpatient services.
  - c. Private provider facilities, such as general practitioners, private nurse offices and consulting offices, pharmacies, and private pathology centres.
  - d. Education settings that manage health care student placements, registration and/or internships in clinical settings.
  - e. Department of Defence health settings including Garrison health centres, deployed and exercise health support and clinical health training settings.
- 6. By capturing these settings, the intention of the AHPPC was to ensure that the following health professionals would be scoped into relevant health directions issued by each state and territory:
  - a. Those in the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (NRAS),
  - b. All self-regulated allied health professionals, and
  - c. All other individuals who work in these settings.

7. A breakdown of health-related professions covered by this scope is provided at <a href="Attachment A">Attachment A</a> (by category). The full AHPPC Statement is provided at <a href="Attachment B">Attachment B</a>. The statement acknowledged that mandating vaccines in this way could have unintended consequences, but these should be considered alongside the benefits of a highly vaccinated workforce.

# Implementation of AHPPC Recommendations

- 8. Despite a AHPPC recommendation that a nationally consistent approach be taken to implementing mandatory vaccination of healthcare workers, all states and territories have progressed in a manner that appears most appropriate to their local context. A summary document outlining each jurisdiction's healthcare worker scope is provided at Attachment C.
- 9. Broadly (and in order of most encompassing to most targeted scope):
  - a. Northern Territory and Queensland are the only jurisdictions to have applied the AHPPC recommendations in full; with the Northern Territory far exceeding the recommended scope of the AHPPC to include all workers that engage with vulnerable persons in their role (with an assumption that a person is considered 'vulnerable' if their vulnerability status is otherwise unknown).
  - b. South Australia has opted for a phased implementation approach that will be completed on 6 December. While substantially like AHPPC recommendations, NRAS and self-regulated allied health professions have been included only where they provide services as part of specialist outpatient facilities.
  - c. Victoria has implemented mandatory vaccination requirements at all sites identified by the AHPPC and has explicitly called for the vaccination of all workers registered under the NRAS, but has not included self-regulated allied health professions like social workers and dieticians.
  - d. NSW, WA and ACT have similar arrangements which limit application to public health and private hospital settings, inclusive of students on placement in these settings. In interjurisdictional meetings, the NSW has flagged their intention to soon expand their vaccination requirements, but the specifics of this are not known at the time of writing this brief.
  - e. WA continues to phase in its mandatory vaccination requirements through a tiered approach to settings. All health service providers (which are identified by instrument and are mostly rural community centres), ambulance and transport settings will be phased in on 1 December for first dose and 1 January 2022 for full vaccination of workers.

# Recent COVID-19 transmission and health outcomes in the ACT

10. The ACT has experienced very successful uptake of vaccines across the eligible population generally, in effect reducing the net benefit achieved by mandating of

#### **OFFICIAL**

- COVID-19 vaccines for the small number of patients that remain unvaccinated. As at 24 November, 97.5% of all Canberrans aged 12-years and older are fully vaccinated and >99% had received their first vaccine dose.
- 11. This high level of vaccination uptake means that the ACT continues to fair well following the relaxing of freedom of movement restrictions in recent weeks. The ACT consistently returns low levels of new cases (< 20) of COVID-19 daily and these numbers remain stable despite businesses reopening and schools returning to face-to-face education.

## ACT Phase 2 healthcare worker mandate options

- 12. My team are assessing four options for the future mandate of ACT healthcare workers, each with their own benefits and limitations, as summarised in <a href="Attachment E">Attachment E</a>.
- 13. Considering the high level of vaccination uptake across the ACT generally and resulting success in managing the transmission and severity of COVID-19, the ACT is likely to only require the adoption of Option 1 or Option 2 in managing COVID-19 transmission. Specifically, these options include:
  - a. Option 1 maintain the current public health direction settings as (combined with other public health and safety measure)s, they appear to be broadly effective in managing the rate of virus transmission.
  - b. Option 2 expand the public healthcare worker mandate to include private health settings as specified in the AHPPC recommendation. This encompasses specialist outpatient services, GPs, pharmacies, pathology centres and private nursing offices.
- 14. The approximate timeframe for implementation of Option 2 is three-weeks, with an expectation that additional staff receive first dose vaccination by 15 December, and full vaccination by 12 January 2022. This timeframe ensures that appropriate consultation can occur with the health sector and impacted staff have sufficient time to be vaccinated prior to identified timeframes.
- 15. Adoption of these Options is being actively considered by my Office and will be discussed directly with you in your capacity as Minister for Health before a decision is made about an appropriate action.

#### External

19. Not explicitly for this brief. However, the views of key stakeholders including the RACGP, AMA, PHN and CHN were all considered in the preparation of this advice.

#### **Work Health and Safety**

- 20. Industrial relations and human rights considerations for mandatory vaccination were considered by the Security and Emergency Management Committee of Cabinet on 15 September 2021, under CAB21/630 (Vaccination Status Policy and Next Steps) and CAB21/632 (Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Industrial Relations Policy Issues).
- 21. Implementing mandatory COVID-19 vaccination requirements for healthcare workers is a strategy for improving work, health, and safety in this critical and high-risk sector. In implementing public health directions, a large and consistent volume of feedback has been provided by employers suggesting that many employers believe that mandating vaccines in this way removes the liability and obligations of an employer under work, health, and safety legislation to manage COVID-19 risks in the workplace. This is not the case and is being managed through targeted messaging to relevant sectors.

# **Benefits/Sensitivities**

- has written on behalf of to Canberra Health Services to seek the inclusion of corrections in future vaccine mandates. Any expansion of healthcare worker vaccine mandates may attract criticism from for its failure to include corrections workers, which in their view, fall under the guise of healthcare support workers.
- 23. As Chief Health Officer, I do not propose to include corrections workers in the scope of public health direction. I note that Cabinet discussions with Minister for Corrections and the Commissioner for Corrections have indicated that it is more appropriate to mandate vaccines as a matter of employment policy in this context.
- 24. The legal mechanism of section 120 public health directions (as notifiable instruments) has attracted criticism from the Human Rights Commission. The ACT's already strong vaccination coverage limits the imperative for widening the scope of the healthcare direction.

# Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) statement on mandatory vaccination of all workers in healthcare settings

Released: 1 October 2021

AHPPC recommends mandatory vaccinations for all workers in health care settings as a condition of work. Further, AHPPC recommends the first dose of a TGA approved COVID-19 vaccine by 30 October 2021 and a second dose by 15 December 2021.

AHPPC also recommends that all jurisdictions accept a national definition of health-care settings in their relevant legislation to ensure consistency. This national definition will include:

- Public health settings including public hospitals, public health clinics, ambulance services, patient transport services, correctional health facilities and other health services managed by a jurisdiction.
- Private health facilities, such as private hospitals or day procedure centres, or specialist outpatient services.
- Private provider facilities, such as general practitioners, private nurse offices and consulting offices, pharmacies and private pathology centres.
- Education settings that manage health care student placements, registration, and/or internships in clinical settings.
- Department of Defence health settings including Garrison health centres, deployed and exercise health support and clinical health training settings.

These settings are intended to capture all health professions, including:

- those in the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme,
- all self-regulated allied health professions as published on the Australian Government Department of Health website, and
- and all other individuals who work in these settings

AHPPC notes the regulatory mechanism with which to mandate health-care settings may vary in the jurisdictions Noting the scope of health care settings in this Statement, jurisdictions may need to implement a staged approach to mandating vaccination for health care workers.

AHPPC notes that Defence manages vaccination requirements for Defence members and employees internally due to the unique operating environments.

AHPPC recommends an exemption for contractors is when they are responding to an emergency. In these cases, AHPPC recommends putting risk mitigation strategies in place to ensure unvaccinated contractors abide by COVID-safe practices.

A substantial health workforce has been necessary to roll out testing, training, vaccination, quarantine, and treatment of COVID-19 patients in the public and private health sectors. Hospitals and health services have been particularly vulnerable to outbreaks resulting in transmission risk in the hospital to staff and patients. This includes the furlough of staff and reduction in health system capacity. Although identified as a priority group for vaccination, there are still workers in health care settings who are unvaccinated.

Vaccination of persons entering health care settings is an important mechanism to protect the public, staff, and patients in these settings. AHPPC has consistently noted that vaccinated individuals are less likely to be significant drivers of spread, and that unvaccinated people dominate community transmission. AHPPC also notes increased rates of community transmission, with the Delta variant present in Australia. This poses an increased risk of exposure to both staff and patients in health care settings.

AHPPC notes that mandating vaccination for this cohort could have unintended consequences, including on the availability of the workforce. This could place increased pressure on a jurisdiction's capacity to meet demand. However, the benefits of a highly vaccinated workforce will ensure minimal transmission in healthcare settings and minimise the need to quarantine and furlough staff.

AHPPC recognises that not all facilities are capable of being monitored for compliance with the proposed vaccine mandates. However, it is considered that these mandates will assist employers in these settings better manage vaccination requirements for employees.

## Background

- 1. On 15 October 2021, I notified a public health direction for workers in certain healthcare settings to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 or have an approved exemption for them to be permitted to attend work under the *Public Health (Health Care and Support Workers COVID-19 Vaccination) Emergency Direction 2021* (the Public Health Direction).
- 2. At the time of commencement, most states and territories in Australia had already, or were in the process of, introducing similar mandatory vaccination requirements for healthcare workers following an Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) recommendation.

#### Issues

#### **AHPPC Recommendation**

- 3. As part of its statement on mandatory vaccination of all workers in healthcare settings released on 1 October 2021, the AHPPC recommended that all jurisdictions accept a national definition of health-care settings when mandating vaccinations. The intent was to ensure (as much as possible) a national definition of healthcare worker.
- 4. The AHPPC recommended mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations for all workers in a healthcare setting as a condition of work, with first doses administered by 30 October 2021 and second doses by 15 December 2021.
- 5. Specifically, the AHPPC recommended that healthcare worker capture:
  - a. Public health settings including public hospitals, public health clinics, ambulance services, patient transport services, correctional health facilities and other health services managed by a jurisdiction.
  - b. Private health facilities such as private hospitals or day procedure centres or specialist outpatient services.
  - c. Private provider facilities, such as general practitioners, private nurse offices and consulting offices, pharmacies, and private pathology centres.
  - d. Education settings that manage health care student placements, registration and/or internships in clinical settings.
  - e. Department of Defence health settings including Garrison health centres, deployed and exercise health support and clinical health training settings.

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- 6. By capturing these settings, the intention of the AHPPC was to ensure that the following health professionals would be scoped into relevant health directions issued by each state and territory:
  - a. Those in the NRAS,
  - b. All self-regulated allied health professionals, and
  - c. All other individuals who work in these settings.
- 7. A breakdown of health-related professions covered by this scope is provided at <a href="Attachment A">Attachment A</a> (by category). The full AHPPC Statement is provided at <a href="Attachment B">Attachment B</a>. The statement acknowledged that mandating vaccines in this way could have unintended consequences, but these should be considered alongside the benefits of a highly vaccinated workforce.

# <u>Implementation of AHPPC Recommendations</u>

- 8. Despite a AHPPC recommendation that a nationally consistent approach be taken to implementing mandatory vaccination of healthcare workers, all states and territories have progressed in a manner that appears most appropriate to their local context. A summary document outlining each jurisdiction's healthcare worker scope is provided at Attachment C.
- 9. Broadly (and in order of most encompassing to most targeted scope):
  - a. Northern Territory and Queensland are the only jurisdictions to have applied the AHPPC recommendations in full; with the Northern Territory far exceeding the recommended scope of the AHPPC to include all workers that engage with vulnerable persons in their role (with an assumption that a person is considered 'vulnerable' if their vulnerability status is otherwise unknown).
  - b. South Australia has opted for a phased implementation approach that will be completed on 6 December 2021. While substantially like AHPPC recommendations, NRAS and self-regulated allied health professions have been included only where they provide services as part of specialist outpatient facilities.
  - c. Victoria has implemented mandatory vaccination requirements at all sites identified by the AHPPC and has explicitly called for the vaccination of all workers registered under the NRAS, but has not included self-regulated allied health professions like social workers and dieticians.
  - d. NSW, WA and ACT have similar arrangements which limit application to public health and private hospital settings, inclusive of students on placement in these settings. In interjurisdictional meetings, the NSW has flagged their intention to soon expand their vaccination requirements, but the specifics of this are not known at the time of writing this brief.
  - e. WA continues to phase in its mandatory vaccination requirements through a tiered approach to settings. All health service providers (which are identified by instrument and are mostly rural community centres), ambulance and transport settings will be phased in on 1 December 2021 for first dose and 1 January 2022 for full vaccination of workers.

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# Recent COVID-19 transmission and health outcomes in the ACT

- 10. The ACT has experienced very successful uptake of vaccines across the eligible population generally, in effect reducing the net benefit achieved by mandating of COVID-19 vaccines for the small number of patients that remain unvaccinated. As at 24 November 2021, 97.5 per cent of all Canberrans aged 12-years and older are fully vaccinated and >99 per cent had received their first vaccine dose.
- 11. This high level of vaccination uptake means that the ACT continues to fair well following the relaxing of freedom of movement restrictions in recent weeks. The ACT consistently returns low levels of new cases (< 20) of COVID-19 daily and these numbers remain stable despite businesses reopening and schools returning to face-to-face education.

# ACT Phase 2 healthcare worker mandate options

- 12. My team are assessing four options for the future mandate of ACT healthcare workers, each with their own benefits and limitations, as summarised in <a href="Attachment E">Attachment E</a>.
- 13. Considering the high level of vaccination uptake across the ACT generally and resulting success in managing the transmission and severity of COVID-19, the ACT is likely to only require the adoption of Option 1 or Option 2 in managing COVID-19 transmission. Specifically, these options include:
  - a. Option 1 maintain the current public health direction settings as (combined with other public health and safety measures), they appear to be broadly effective in managing the rate of virus transmission.
  - b. Option 2 expand the public healthcare worker mandate to include private health settings as specified in the AHPPC recommendation. This encompasses specialist outpatient services, General Practitioners, pharmacies, pathology centres and private nursing offices.
- 14. The approximate timeframe for implementation of Option 2 is three-weeks, with an expectation that additional staff receive first dose vaccination by 15 December 2021, and full vaccination by 12 January 2022. This timeframe ensures that appropriate consultation can occur with the health sector and impacted staff have sufficient time to be vaccinated prior to identified timeframes.
- 15. Adoption of these Options is being actively considered by my Office and will be discussed directly with you in your capacity as Minister for Health before a decision is made about an appropriate action.

# **External**

19. Not explicitly for this brief. However, the views of key stakeholders including the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, Australian Medical Association, Primary Health Network and Capital Health Network were all considered in the preparation of this advice.

# **Work Health and Safety**

- 20. Industrial relations and human rights considerations for mandatory vaccination were considered by the Security and Emergency Management Committee of Cabinet on 15 September 2021, under CAB21/630 (Vaccination Status Policy and Next Steps) and CAB21/632 (Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Industrial Relations Policy Issues).
- 21. Implementing mandatory COVID-19 vaccination requirements for healthcare workers is a strategy for improving work, health, and safety in this critical and high-risk sector. In implementing public health directions, a large and consistent volume of feedback has been provided by employers suggesting that many employers believe that mandating vaccines in this way removes the liability and obligations of an employer under work, health, and safety legislation to manage COVID-19 risks in the workplace. This is not the case and is being managed through targeted messaging to relevant sectors.

#### **Benefits/Sensitivities**

- has written on behalf of to Canberra Health Services to seek the inclusion of corrections in future vaccine mandates. Any expansion of healthcare worker vaccine mandates may attract criticism from Winnunga for its failure to include corrections workers, which in their view, fall under the guise of healthcare support workers.
- 23. As Chief Health Officer, I do not propose to include corrections workers in the scope of public health direction. I note that Cabinet discussions with Minister for Corrections and the Commissioner for Corrections have indicated that it is more appropriate to mandate vaccines as a matter of employment policy in this context.
- 24. The legal mechanism of section 120 public health directions (as notifiable instruments) has attracted criticism from the Human Rights Commission. The ACT's already strong vaccination coverage limits the imperative for widening the scope of the healthcare direction.



I refer to the letter of 5 October 2021 from M/- Colm Mooney inviting a submission from on a proposal to mandate COVID-19 vaccinations for health care workers.

In that letter it was advised that the Chief Health Officer proposed, on 15 October 2021 to sign a public health direction, after having considered the feedback received through that consultation.

As you would be aware provided a detailed submission to CHECC in which she applauded the decision to mandate vaccination for all health care and other staff employed in "all health care facilities operated by Canberra Health Services."

was in particular pleased that this decision would therefore apply to Canberra Health Services in correctional facilities, most particularly the AMC, and would apply as a matter of course to all prison officers who come into contact with detainees.

This scope was imposed to ensure that patients are as safety as possible when accessing care in critical and high-risk health care settings. I have not extended the requirement to cover prison officers, except in circumstances where they are required to attend a healthcare facility listed above.

All correctional officers at the AMC have been eligible for the COVID-19 vaccination as a priority under Phase 1B of the vaccine rollout plan. They have been encouraged to be vaccinated at an ACT Government clinic or through a participating general practice.

I have referred your email to the Commissioner for Corrections to seek information about the work, health and safety measures being implemented to promote the safety of staff and residents at the AMC against COVID-19. The Commissioner has informed me that they are considering requiring vaccinations as a potential measure alongside others for reducing COVID-19 risks.
